Assessment Determination
<p>If any species is categorised as Endangered or Critically Endangered on IUCN's Red List, or if it appears in the CITES appendices, it cannot be approved for use as Marin Trust raw material. Whiting (<i>Merlangius merlangus</i>) is neither listed as Endangered or Critically Endangered on IUCN's Red List, nor listed in CITES appendices; therefore, whiting is eligible for approval for use as Marin Trust by-product raw material.</p> <p>An EU multiannual management plan (MAP) for stocks in Western waters and adjacent waters take into account bycatch of this stock. Note that there is no agreement with U.K. regarding this stock. Reference points are defined for the stock. Therefore, it was assessed under category C.</p> <p>Fishery removals are included in the stock assessment process, it PASSES Clause C1.1. The stock is considered, in its most recent stock assessment, to have a biomass above the limit reference point, it PASSES Clause C1.2.</p> <p>Therefore, whiting in ICES Division 6.a (West of Scotland) is <b>APPROVED</b> for the production of fishmeal and fish oil under the current Marin Trust v 2.0 by-products.</p>
Fishery Assessment Peer Review Comments
<p>The assessor correctly classified the whiting in ICES Division 6.a (West of Scotland) as category C, the stock is managed, and reference points are defined to assess the stock status against. Fishery removals from the stock are considered in the stock assessment process. The most recent stock assessment shows that the stock is considered to have a biomass well above the limit reference point. Therefore, whiting in ICES Division 6.a (West of Scotland) fishery passes both C1.1 and C1.2 and therefore the whiting in ICES Division 6.a (West of Scotland) is approved</p>

## Species Categorisation

### IUCN Red list Category

- VULNERABLE (VU) facing a high risk of extinction in the wild.
- NEAR THREATENED (NT) does not qualify for above now, but is close or is likely to qualify for, a threatened category in the near future.
- LEAST CONCERN (LC) Widespread and abundant.
- DATA DEFICIENT (DD) and NOT EVALUATED (NE)

<p>The stock assessment type is an age-based analytical model (SAM) that uses catches (commercial landings, estimated discards, age composition of catches) in the model and the forecast. Catches are presented in Figure 1.</p> <p>Therefore, fishery removals of the stock, including from the fishery under assessment, are included in the stock assessment process, it <b>PASSES Clause C1.1</b></p>			
<p>The chart shows a clear downward trend in total catches over time. Landings and discards are both present, with discards generally making up a significant portion of the total catch, especially in the earlier years. The total catch starts at approximately 14,000 t in 1983 and reaches a low of about 1,000 t by 2020.</p>			
<p><b>Figure 1.</b> Whiting in ICES Subarea 4 and in Division 7.d. Long-term trends in catches.</p>			
<b>C1.2 The species is considered, in its most recent stock assessment, to have a biomass above the limit reference point (or proxy), OR removals by the fishery under assessment are considered by scientific authorities to be negligible.</b>

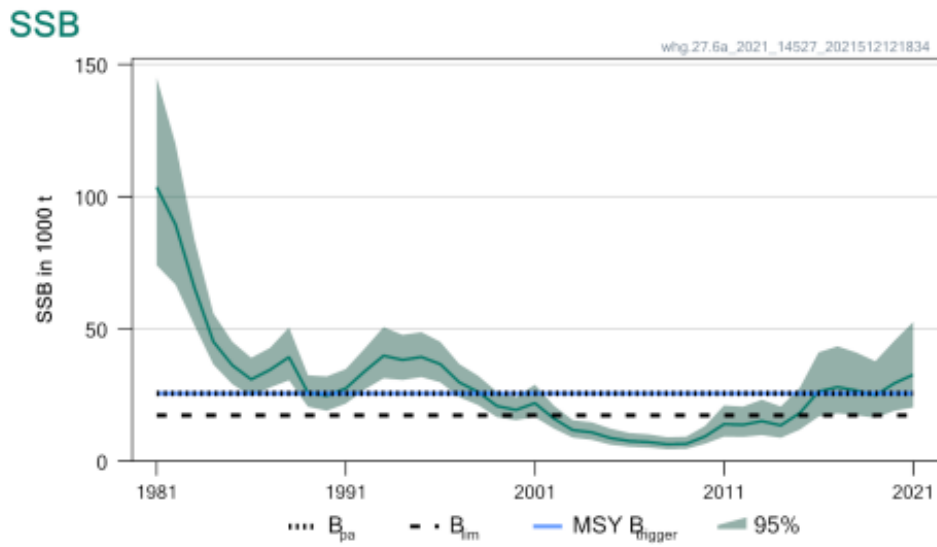


Figure 2. Whiting in ICES Division 6.a. Spawning stock biomass.

<p>The spawning-stock size is above MSY <math>B_{trigger}</math>, <math>B_{pa}</math> and <math>B_{lim}</math> (Figure 2).</p> <p>Therefore, the stock is considered, in its most recent stock assessment, to have a biomass above the limit reference point, <b>C1.2 is met.</b></p>

The comparative lack of scientific information on the status of the population of the species means that a risk-assessment style approach must be taken.
